HAVE QUESTIONS ABOUT DOG TRAINING AND BEHAVIOR???

Dogs are very smart animals, so how do we get them to do what we want? Or, not do what we don't want them to do? We asked our friend Stacy Engebretson to give us a few dog training pointers. What does Stacy say is the most important thing when training? Patience.

"[Patience] is the most important and hardest thing about training. It is hard enough to have patience in a single session, but it is just as important to have patience in reaching your training goal. Write down concrete, measurable units of the dog's performance (8/10 sits, 5 min to stop barking, etc) and make a progress chart when training. If you get caught up in single-session improvements or day to day improvement, it can be too slow to notice change. The risk is that the owner or trainer loses confidence in the training and stops. Also, just as people have different learning speeds, so do dogs! One may learn how to jump through a hoop and balance on its front paws in the same amount of time it takes another dog to learn how to lie down. Don't get discouraged if yours is the later.

Patience, compassion, and a good sense of

humor will go a long way. You may know all the techniques, theories, rules, and gadgets; without patience, compassion, and a sense of humor you'll never go from a "good" trainer to a "great" one."

WE ARE LOOKING FOR QUALIFIED VOLUNTEERS

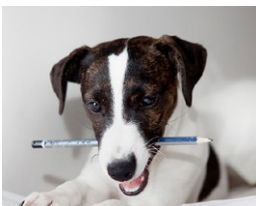

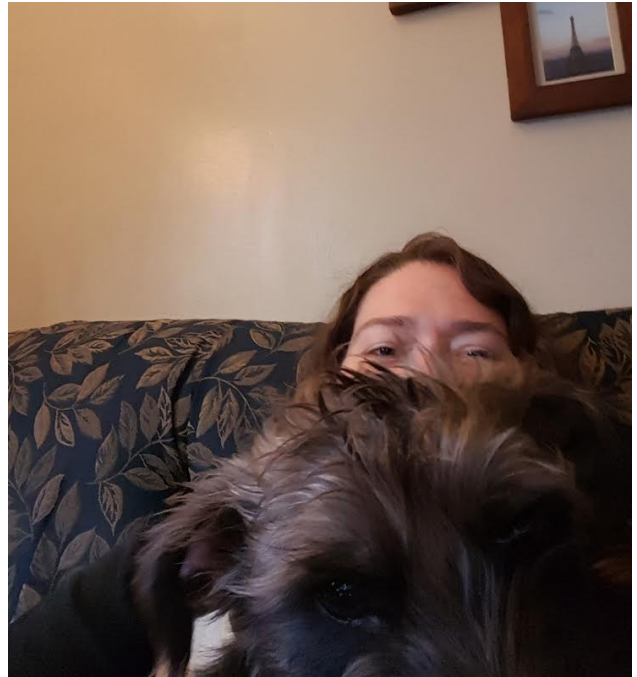


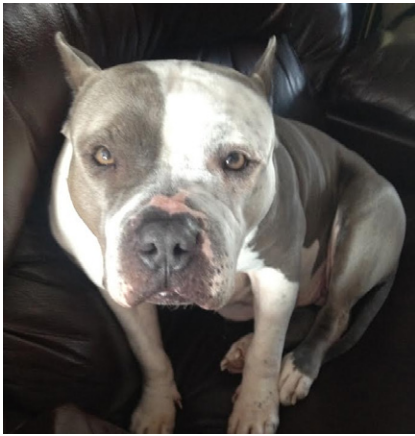
I wanted to send in some pictures of Howie (formerly Desmond) in his new home. We're getting along

Chad and I wanted to make good on our promise to send pics and give you

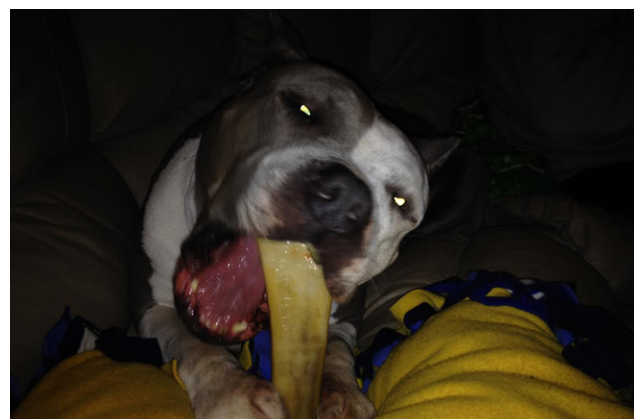
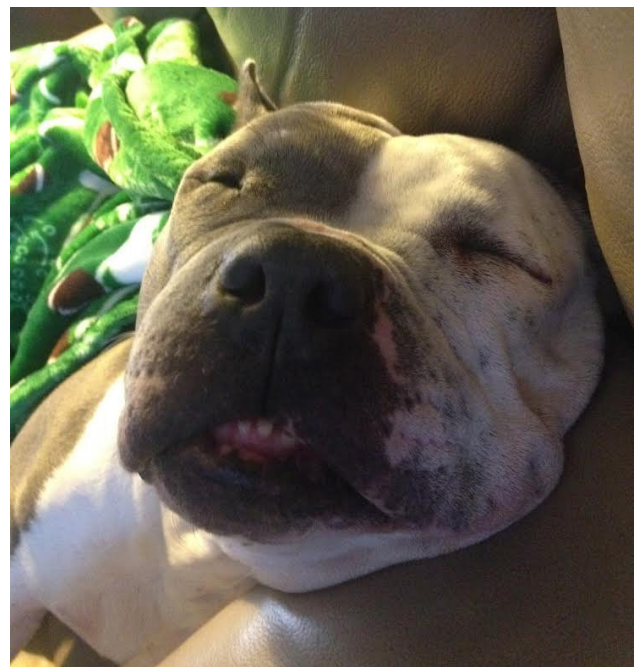

KITTY

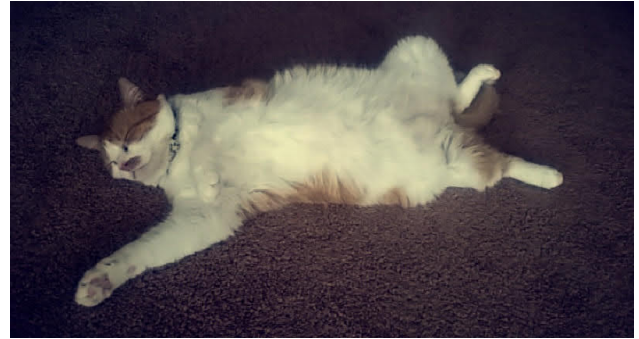
